What is textual evidence?	Textual evidence refers to specific details or quotes from a text that support an analysis or argument.
Why is strong evidence	
important?	Strong evidence is crucial because it directly supports the analysis and makes the argument more convincing.
How do you determine if	
evidence is relevant?	Evidence is relevant if it directly relates to the point being made and effectively supports the argument.
What are inferences?	
	Inferences are conclusions drawn from the text that go beyond what is
How can inferences be supported?	explicitly stated.
	Inferences can be supported by citing specific passages and details from the text that lead to the conclusion.
