Preparation for discussions	Effective discussions require thorough preparation, including reading and researching the material.
Evidence from texts	Students should bring evidence from texts and research to support their
Research methods	points.
Engaging in discussions	Basic research methods include identifying credible sources and extracting key information.
Common misconceptions	During discussions, students should refer to their notes and evidence to contribute thoughtfully.
	Misconception 1: Reading alone is enough. Misconception 2: Opinions are as valid as evidence.
