Cues	Notes
What is a claim?	A claim is a statement that asserts a viewpoint or belief.
Why is evidence important?	Evidence is crucial to support claims and make them credible.
What are counterclaims?	Counterclaims are opposing viewpoints that need to be addressed.
How do you organize an argument?	An argument should be logically organized with clear sequencing of claims, counterclaims, reasons, and evidence.
What makes an argument strong?	A strong argument is well-supported by evidence, addresses counterclaims, and is logically organized.
