Cues	Notes
What is textual evidence?	Textual evidence is information from a text that supports an argument or claim.
How to identify relevant	
evidence?	Relevant evidence directly supports the claim and is contextually appropriate.
Difference between summary	
and analysis?	Summary recounts the text; analysis interprets and connects evidence to arguments.
Common misconceptions about	
evidence?	Misconception: Any text info can be evidence; Reality: Only relevant info supports claims.
Steps to analyze evidence?	
	Steps: Identify main ideas, find supporting details, connect evidence to claims, analyze context.

Summary

Understanding how to draw and analyze evidence from texts is crucial for supporting arguments in writing. Students must differentiate between relevant and irrelevant evidence and move beyond summary to deeper analysis.
