| What is literary nonfiction? | Literary nonfiction includes essays, speeches, and other factual texts. |
| How to identify bias in historical texts? | Bias can be identified through rhetorical devices and persuasive language. |
| Examples of legal reasoning in texts? | Legal reasoning can be found in Supreme Court opinions, public advocacy, etc. |
| What are rhetorical devices? | Rhetorical devices include ethos, pathos, logos, and other persuasive techniques. |
