What is a preposition?	A preposition is a word that shows the relationship between a noun (or pronoun) and other words in a sentence.
Examples of prepositions	
	Examples: during, beyond, toward, under, over, before, after
Why are prepositions	
important?	Prepositions help clarify the relationships between different parts of a sentence, making communication clearer.
Common misconceptions about	
prepositions	Misconception 1: Prepositions are the same as conjunctions. Misconception 2: Prepositions only indicate location.
How to use prepositions	
correctly	Use prepositions to describe time, place, direction, and other relationships. Practice with varied examples.
