## **Understanding Prefixes and New Words**

## Today's Standard

2.L.4b - Determine the meaning of the new word formed when a known prefix is added to a known word (e.g., happy/unhappy, tell/retell).

Cues	Notes
What is a prefix?	A prefix is a group of letters added to the beginning of a word to change its meaning.
How does a prefix change a word?	Prefixes can change the meaning of a word in various ways, not just to its opposite.
Examples of common prefixes	Common prefixes include 'un-', 're-', 'pre-', 'dis-', 'mis-'.
Common misconceptions about prefixes	Misconception: Prefixes always change the word to its opposite meaning. Reality: They can change the meaning in different ways.

## Summary

Understanding prefixes helps in decoding new words and improving vocabulary. Not all prefixes change words to their opposites, and not all prefixes can be added to any word.
