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| What are modal auxiliaries? | Modal auxiliaries are helping verbs that express necessity, possibility, permission, or ability. |
| How do modal auxiliaries change sentence meaning? | Modal auxiliaries change the meaning of the main verb to reflect different conditions or intentions. |
| Examples of modal auxiliaries | Examples include: can, may, must, should, might. |
| Common mistakes with modal | Examples metade. can, may, must, should, might. |
| auxiliaries | Common mistakes include using the wrong modal for the context or thinking they are interchangeable. |
