What is a prepositional phrase?	A prepositional phrase starts with a preposition and ends with a noun or pronoun.
Why are prepositional phrases important?	They add detail to sentences, explaining where, when, or how something happens.
How do you form a prepositional phrase?	Formed by combining a preposition with a noun or pronoun (e.g., 'under the table').
Common misconceptions about prepositional phrases	Misconception 1: Prepositional phrases can be complete sentences. Misconception 2: Confusing prepositional phrases with adverbs or adjectives.
Examples of prepositional phrases	Examples: 'on the desk,' 'before the storm,' 'with a smile.'
