What are allusions?	Allusions are indirect references to a person, place, thing, or idea of historical, cultural, literary, or political significance.
Examples of mythological	
allusions	Examples include 'Herculean' (referring to Hercules) and 'Achilles' heel' (referring to Achilles).
Why are allusions important?	
	Allusions add deeper meaning and context to a text, enhancing
How to identify allusions in a text	comprehension and appreciation.
	To identify allusions, look for references to well-known stories, characters, or historical events.
