What is an idiom?	An idiom is a phrase or expression that has a figurative meaning different from its literal meaning.
What is a proverb?	
Examples of idioms	A proverb is a short, commonly known saying that expresses a general truth or piece of advice.
Examples of proverbs	Examples of idioms: 'Break the ice', 'Piece of cake', 'Raining cats and dogs'.
Why are idioms and proverbs important?	Examples of proverbs: 'Actions speak louder than words', 'The early bird catches the worm', 'A stitch in time saves nine'.
