Notes
Cohesion refers to the way words, phrases, and clauses are used to connect ideas and help the writing flow logically.
Transitional phrases are words or groups of words that help to link sentences and paragraphs together smoothly.
Clear relationships help the reader understand how different parts of the argument are connected and support the main claim.
A counterclaim is an argument that opposes the main claim, and it is
important to address it to strengthen your own argument.
Connecting evidence to a claim involves explaining how the evidence supports or proves the claim, often using transitional phrases.
