What is a connotation?	Connotation refers to the associations and emotional meanings we attach to a word.
How do connotations differ from denotations?	Denotations are the literal dictionary definitions of words, whereas connotations are the additional meanings and feelings associated with
Why are connotations important?	them.
Can connotations change based on context?	Understanding connotations helps in effective communication and literary analysis by conveying specific tones and emotions.
Examples of words with different connotations.	Yes, connotations can be neutral, positive, or negative depending on the context in which a word is used.
amerene connectations.	Examples: 'Stingy' vs. 'Thrifty' – both mean careful with money, but 'stingy' has a negative connotation while 'thrifty' has a positive one.
