| What is an argument? | An argument is a set of reasons or evidence in support of a conclusion. |
| What are claims? | Claims are statements that assert something to be true. |
| How do you identify evidence? | Evidence includes facts, statistics, and examples that support a claim. |
| What is the difference between fact and opinion? | Facts are verifiable truths, while opinions are personal beliefs. |
| Why is it important to evaluate arguments? | Evaluating arguments helps determine the credibility and validity of information. |
