What is media comparison?	Media comparison involves analyzing how different formats (text, audio, video) portray the same subject.
How does medium affect	
message impact?	The medium affects the message's impact through tone, emphasis, and visual elements.
Examples of different media	
formats?	Examples include books vs. movies, podcasts vs. transcripts, live vs. recorded speeches.
Why is media literacy	
important?	Media literacy helps students critically evaluate information and understand bias and perspective.
