What is textual evidence?	Textual evidence refers to specific details or quotes from a text used to support an analysis.
How do you support an	
analysis?	Supporting an analysis involves citing several pieces of evidence to back up claims about what the text says explicitly and what can be inferred.
What are inferences?	
	Inferences are conclusions drawn from evidence and reasoning rather
Why is multiple evidence important?	than from explicit statements.
	Using multiple pieces of evidence provides a stronger, more comprehensive support for an analysis, making the argument more convincing.

Summary

To analyze a text effectively, students must cite multiple pieces of textual evidence to support their claims and inferences, which strengthens their arguments and demonstrates a deeper understanding of the text.
