## Analyzing Figurative Language and Sound Devices

What is figurative language?	Figurative language uses words or expressions with a meaning different from the literal interpretation.
What are connotative	
meanings?	Connotative meanings are the emotions and associations connected to a word beyond its literal definition.
How do sound devices affect a	
text?	Sound devices like rhyme and alliteration can enhance the mood, rhythm, and meaning of a text.
Examples of alliteration	
	Alliteration: Repetition of initial consonant sounds in nearby words (e.g.,
Examples of rhyme	'She sells sea shells').
	Rhyme: Repetition of similar sounding words, often at the end of lines in poems.
