What is textual evidence?	Textual evidence refers to specific details or quotes from a text that support an analysis or argument.
How to identify strong evidence?	Strong evidence is directly related to the analysis and provides clear support for the argument.
What are inferences?	Inferences are logical conclusions drawn from the text based on specific details.
Why is textual evidence important?	Textual evidence is important for validating arguments and ensuring they are well-supported.
How to support inferences with evidence?	Inferences must be supported by concrete evidence from the text to be credible.
