How should students use evidence in discussions?	Students should take detailed notes and highlight key evidence. Using evidence makes arguments more credible.
What are common misconceptions about discussion preparation?	Common misconceptions include thinking that reading alone is enough and that opinions don't need evidence.
How can teachers address these misconceptions?
