What is textual evidence?	Textual evidence refers to specific details from a text that support an analysis or argument.
How to evaluate a source?	
Why cite sources?	Evaluating a source involves checking the author's credentials, publication date, and the context of the information.
Primary vs. Secondary sources	Citing sources is crucial to give credit to original authors and to provide evidence for your analysis.
Common misconceptions	Primary sources are original documents from the time period being studied, while secondary sources interpret or analyze primary sources.
	Misconception: All information in a source is equally valid. Reality: Sources vary in credibility and need to be evaluated.
