| What is the main idea? | Main idea is the central point the author wants to convey. |
| How does the author develop their claims? | Author develops claims through specific sentences, paragraphs, and sections. |
| What are key sentences and paragraphs? | Key sentences/paragraphs are pivotal in refining the argument. |
| How does the text structure contribute to the argument? | Text structure (e.g., cause/effect, compare/contrast) helps organize and present claims. |
| What changes in the author's claims can be observed? | Claims may evolve as the author provides more evidence or addresses counterarguments. |

Analyzing how an author's ideas or claims are developed involves understanding the role of specific parts of the text and recognizing the evolution of the author's argument.
