What is intertextuality?	Intertextuality refers to the relationship between different texts and how they influence each other.
Examples of source material	
transformation	Examples include Shakespeare's 'Romeo and Juliet' and its transformation into 'West Side Story'.
Why is understanding source material important?	Understanding source material provides deeper insights and enhances the appreciation of new works.
Common misconceptions	
	Misconception: Authors only copy source material. Reality: Authors add
Key terms: theme, motif, adaptation	unique elements and reinterpret themes.
	Key terms: theme, motif, adaptation, intertextuality.
