Key terms	Cohesion refers to the flow and connectivity of ideas in writing.
What is cohesion?	Linking text sections involves using words, phrases, and clauses to show relationships between ideas.
How to link text sections?	Addressing counterclaims strengthens your argument by showing you've
Why address counterclaims?	considered multiple perspectives.
Examples of transitions	Examples of transitions include 'therefore', 'however', 'in addition', 'consequently'.
	Using transitions helps clarify the relationships between claims, reasons, and evidence.
