| Cues | Notes |
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| What is evidence-based writing? | Evidence-based writing involves using information from texts to support arguments and ideas. |
| How to evaluate source credibility? | Source credibility can be evaluated by looking at the author's credentials, publication date, and the evidence provided. |
| Difference between summary and analysis? | Summarizing is restating main points; analyzing examines components and their implications. |
| What are informational texts? | Informational texts provide factual information and are used for research and learning. |
| How to integrate multiple sources? | Integrating multiple sources involves combining information from different texts to support a cohesive argument. |

Summary

Evidence-based writing uses information from texts to support analysis. Evaluating source credibility and distinguishing between summary and analysis are key skills. Integrating multiple sources strengthens arguments.
