## Today's Standard

Cues	Notes
What is a claim?	A claim is a statement that asserts a point, belief, or truth and requires evidence to support it.
How do you distinguish a claim	
from an opinion?	A claim is supported by evidence, while an opinion is a personal belief that does not necessarily require evidence.
What are counterclaims?	
	Counterclaims are arguments that oppose the original claim.
Why is it important to address	
counterclaims?	Addressing counterclaims shows thorough understanding and strengthens the original argument by refuting opposing views.
How do you organize an	
argument?	Organize an argument by clearly stating the claim, supporting it with evidence, addressing counterclaims, and refuting them with further evidence.
