Today, I learned about pronouns. Pronouns are words that take the place of nouns. We use personal pronouns like 'I' and 'they', possessive pronouns like 'my' and 'their', and indefinite pronouns like 'anyone' and 'everything'.

Common Stumbling Blocks

Sometimes, kids mix up possessive pronouns with contractions, like 'their' and 'they're'. Another common mistake is using too many indefinite pronouns, which can make sentences unclear.
