

Comparing and Ordering Lengths

Today's Standard

1.MD.A1 - Order three objects by length; compare the lengths of two objects indirectly by using a third object.

Real-World Applications for this Standard

Comparing the lengths of pencils, crayons, and erasers.; Ordering different pieces of string from shortest to longest.; Using a ruler to compare the lengths of books and notebooks.; Determining which of three sticks is the longest.
