Common Stumbling Blocks

Sometimes, kids might mix up long and short vowel sounds. They might also think all vowels in a word sound the same. We can help by practicing with different words and listening carefully.

Help Me

Understanding vowel sounds helps us read and spell words correctly. For example, knowing that 'a' in 'cake' is long and 'a' in 'cat' is short helps us say and spell these words right. We can practice by listening to words and saying them out loud.
