Common Stumbling Blocks

Sometimes kids think all connections are equally important, but some are more central to the story. Another common mistake is thinking all connections are clearly stated, but some are implied and need to be figured out.

- What happened because of the big event in the story?
- How are these two ideas related?
- Can you find a cause and effect in the text?
- What do you think is the main connection in this piece of information?

Help Me

When we read, we often find connections between different parts of the text. For example, one event might cause another event to happen. Understanding these connections helps us understand the text better. We see these connections in real life too, like how brushing your teeth helps keep them healthy.
