Today | Learned

Today, we learned about making complete sentences. A complete sentence tells a whole idea, like 'The cat runs.' This helps us talk clearly and understand each other better.

Common Stumbling Blocks

Sometimes, kids might use parts of sentences, like just saying 'runs fast,' which doesn't tell the whole idea. Other times, they might make sentences too long and confusing. We need to help them say just enough to be clear.
