Today, we learned about compound words. These are words made up of two smaller words put together, like 'birdhouse' or 'notebook'. Understanding these helps us read and write better.

Common Stumbling Blocks

Sometimes, kids think that the meaning of a compound word is just the two words put together, like thinking a 'housefly' is a house that flies. Another mistake is thinking all long words are compound words, but that's not true.
