Writing Opinion Pieces

Today's Standard

2.W.1 - Write opinion pieces in which they introduce the topic or book they are writing about, state an opinion, supply reasons that support the opinion, use linking words (e.g., because, and, also) to connect opinion and reasons, and provide a concluding statement or section.

Writing a book review; Composing a letter to the principal; Creating a persuasive poster; Writing a blog post about a favorite hobby; Drafting a speech for a class presentation

Today I Learned

Today we learned how to write opinion pieces. This means we can tell what we think about a topic, give reasons why we think that, and finish with a strong ending.

Common Stumbling Blocks

Sometimes kids think they don't need to give reasons for their opinions, but reasons help explain why they think that way. Also, some kids might forget to write a conclusion, but conclusions are important to wrap up their writing.
