Today, we learned how to use words that sound the same but mean different things, like 'to', 'too', and 'two'.

Common Stumbling Blocks

Sometimes kids mix up 'there', 'their', and 'they're' because they sound the same. 'There' means a place, 'their' shows something belongs to someone, and 'they're' means 'they are'. They also mix up 'to', 'too', and 'two'. 'To' is like going to a place, 'too' means also, and 'two' is the number 2.
