Help Me

Quotation marks help us show when someone is talking or when we use exact words from a book. For example, if you write a story with characters talking, you use quotation marks to show who is speaking. When you quote a book, you also use quotation marks. Remember, commas go inside the quotation marks in American English. This helps make your writing clear and easy to read.
