Today I Learned

Today, we learned about idioms and proverbs. Idioms are phrases that don't mean exactly what the words say, like 'it's raining cats and dogs'. Proverbs are short sayings that give advice, like 'a penny saved is a penny earned'.

Common Stumbling Blocks

Sometimes kids think idioms mean exactly what the words say. For example, they might think 'raining cats and dogs' means animals are falling from the sky. Another problem is mixing up sayings that sound similar, like 'a stitch in time saves nine' and 'a penny saved is a penny earned'.
