Common Stumbling Blocks

Sometimes, students mix up perfect tenses with simple past tense. They also might think 'have' and 'had' can be used the same way. It's important to know the differences to use them correctly.

Help Me

Perfect tenses help us talk about actions that happened at different times. For example, 'I have finished my homework' means the homework is done now. 'I had finished my homework before dinner' means it was done before dinner time. Using perfect tenses helps us explain when things happened more clearly.
