Common Stumbling Blocks

Sometimes kids think everything they read is true, but some things are just opinions or guesses. Also, they might mix up reasoned judgments with guesses. Reasoned judgments are based on facts, while guesses are not.

When reading, it's important to know if something is a fact, an opinion, or a guess. For example, if a scientist says 'Water boils at 100 degrees Celsius,' that's a fact. If they say 'I think it will rain tomorrow,' that's a guess. Knowing the difference helps us understand and trust the information we read.
