Today I Learned

Today we learned about connotations. Connotations are the feelings or ideas that words make us think of. For example, 'stingy' and 'thrifty' both mean careful with money, but 'stingy' feels negative and 'thrifty' feels positive.

Common Stumbling Blocks

Some kids might think that words with similar meanings always have the same feelings attached to them. Others might think that words can only have good or bad feelings. But words can have different feelings depending on how they are used.
