Today's Standard

6.RL.7 - Compare and contrast the experience of reading a story, drama, or poem to listening to or viewing an audio, video, or live version of the text, including contrasting what they 'see' and 'hear' when reading the text to what they perceive when they listen or watch.

Real-World Applications for this Standard

Watch a movie adaptation of a book and discuss differences.; Listen to an audiobook and compare it to reading the text.; Attend a live play of a story read in class and note differences.; Compare a poem read aloud to reading it silently.

Common Stumbling Blocks
