Today, we learned about using commas to separate adjectives that describe a noun equally. For example, in 'It was a fascinating, enjoyable movie,' both adjectives describe the movie separately, so we use a comma.

Common Stumbling Blocks

Some students think that all adjectives need commas, but that's not true. Only adjectives that describe a noun equally need commas. Also, some think commas are optional, but they are important for clear writing.
