Common Stumbling Blocks

Sometimes, kids mix up the conditional and subjunctive moods. The conditional mood talks about things that might happen, while the subjunctive mood talks about wishes or demands. Another common mix-up is thinking the imperative mood is only for commands, but it can also be used to give advice or make requests.
