Analyzing Dialogue and Incidents

Today's Standard

8.RL.3 - Analyze how particular lines of dialogue or incidents in a story or drama propel the action, reveal aspects of a character, or provoke a decision.

Real-World Applications for this Standard

Discussing how a character's decision in a novel affects the plot.; Analyzing a pivotal scene in a play to understand character development.; Examining how a specific dialogue reveals hidden motives of a character.; Identifying how a critical incident in a story leads to a major turning point.

Common Stumbling Blocks

Sometimes, kids might think every part of a story is equally important, but some parts are more important than others. They might also think that what characters say only moves the story along, but it also shows what kind of people they are.
