Today's Standard

Real-World Applications for this Standard

Adding 's' to words like 'cat' to make 'cats'; Adding 'es' to words like 'box' to make 'boxes'; Using plural nouns in sentences, e.g., 'I have two dogs.'; Identifying plural nouns in a storybook; Practicing plural nouns with classroom objects, e.g., 'pencils', 'erasers'

Today I Learned

Today we learned how to make nouns plural by adding 's' or 'es'. For example, 'cat' becomes 'cats' and 'box' becomes 'boxes'.

Common Stumbling Blocks

Some kids might think you always add 's' to make a word plural, but that's not right. Others might mix up plurals with possessives, like 'dog's' instead of 'dogs'.
