Making 10 with Numbers

Today's Standard

K.OA.A4 - For any number from 1 to 9, find the number that makes 10 when added to the given number, e.g., by using objects or drawings, and record the answer with a drawing or equation.

Real-World Applications for this Standard

Using ten-frames to find pairs that make 10; Counting objects like blocks or beads to make 10; Drawing pictures to illustrate pairs that add up to 10; Using fingers to visually represent numbers that add up to 10; Playing games that involve combining numbers to make 10, such as card games

Today, we learned how to find two numbers that add up to 10. This helps us understand addition better.

Common Stumbling Blocks

Sometimes, kids think only numbers next to each other can make 10. They might also find it hard to understand without seeing or touching objects.

Help Me

Finding two numbers that make 10 helps us in real life. For example, if you have 4 apples and you need 10, you know you need 6 more. This is called making 10.
