

# Spoken Words to Written Letters

### Today's Standard

Some kids might think that letters can be in any order to make words. Others might not understand that the words they hear are the same as the ones they see written down.

### Help Me

Words we speak are made up of letters in a specific order. This is important for reading and writing. For example, the word 'cat' has the letters C, A, and T in that order. If we change the order, it becomes a different word or doesn't make sense.
