Identifying initial sounds in words during storytime; Sounding out letters in everyday words on signs and labels; Playing phonics games that focus on consonant sounds; Using letter tiles to form simple words; Reading simple CVC (consonant-vowel-consonant) words

Common Stumbling Blocks

Sometimes kids think each letter only makes one sound, but that's not true. Also, some letters sound similar, like 'b' and 'd', which can be confusing.
