



Storytelling with Drawings and Words

Today's Standard

K.W.3 - Use a combination of drawing, dictating, and writing to narrate a single event or several loosely linked events, tell about the events in the order in which they occurred, and provide a reaction to what happened.

Real-World Applications for this Standard

Drawing a picture of a birthday party and writing a sentence about it.; Dictating a story about a trip to the zoo while the teacher writes it down.; Creating a simple comic strip that shows a sequence of events.; Writing and illustrating a short story about a favorite toy.

Today I Learned

Today, we learned how to tell a story using pictures, words, and writing. We practiced drawing a picture of something that happened, telling the story in the right order, and sharing how we felt about it.

Common Stumbling Blocks

Sometimes kids think that their drawings don't need to match their words, or they might tell the events out of order. It's important to help them see how their pictures and words work together and to tell the story in the right order.

- Can you draw a picture of something that happened today?
- What happened first in your story?
- What happened next?
- Can you tell me how you felt about what happened?
- Can you write a sentence about your picture?

We learned how to tell a story by drawing pictures and writing words. For example, if we went to the park, we might draw a picture of playing on the swings, then write 'I played on the swings.' This helps us tell our story in the right order and share how we felt about it.
